Whether you've lived in the same place your entire life, or you've relocated numerous times, you have a wanderer's soul. When you think about it, each of us is prone to wander from God. The season of Advent holds an invitation for all of us to readjust ourselves and discover the wonder of a life-changing journey toward Bethlehem...and beyond. This year, I am inviting all of you to take your families and friends on that journey.

Proverbs 27:8 says: "Like a bird that wanders from her nest, so is a man who wanders from his home." We are born seekers...we know in our souls that there must be something more than the here and now of the world around us. But we also know that sometimes our seeking hearts can launch us on journeys that lead nowhere.

The melody and lyrics of the beloved carol quoted above capture the situation well for all of us. Originally an Appalachian folk song, the words call each one of us to step outside of our normally scheduled lives and into a journey meant to orient our souls toward the One who came seeking each one of us.

Christmas season has the effect on us...our minds wander back to our own childhood and we wonder where has it all gone.

In a culture where commercial celebrations of Christmas seem to begin a little earlier every year, (I saw decorations in the stores before Halloween), Advent is a call to step off the pop culture superhighway and take the scenic route as we wander toward Bethlehem. Whether this is your first Advent or your eightieth, the journey is new every year. As we walk through time this Advent, we're invited, (and we should invite others), to hear the story and wonder as we wander, discovering anew the wonder of God's gift to us, His son, Jesus.

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In real life our wanderings have often led us away from God and all that He has for us. Let us learn and teach the lessons of Advent this year and go into the month of January, knowing that the wandering and wondering is meant to continue, for all of our lives!

The first few pages of the Bible contain the beginning of mankind's "prone to wander hearts and souls." In those pages, we discover that our first parents, Adam and Eve, first wandered from God when together they chose to disobey Him. As a consequence of that choice, God sent them from the perfect home that He had created for them, into a world that was hostile in many ways. There was no way of return to Eden.

Though the journey from Eden has given humanity a history full of pain and sorrow, there is also grace embedded in our wandering. The impossibility of a return to the Garden has meant that we have been given the opportunity to learn to walk with God as we move toward a destination we can't begin to fully imagine or understand.

Again, and again, Scripture shows and tells us that His ways are not our ways. The Bible shows us how God uses imperfect people, ordinary places, and impossible circumstances to unfold His perfect plan to rescue and redeem prone-to-wander humans like you and I. So, during Advent, the question to wander about is what is He trying to tell you specifically, that would call you and your loved ones into a closer relationship with Him?

Know that His grace is always at work in your lives...YES, even during this busy season of manmade distractions and celebrations, he is calling the faithful to rejoice in the story. Think about who you would like to invite to hear it...and truly celebrate! Will you wander aimlessly our will you wonder with purpose for the kingdom? As always, the season itself is calling us to commit to HIM.

B.L.A.S. f.: The BLAST program is run in a similar fashion as the VBS program we offer in the summer. We start with providing a kid friendly meal, followed by a time of worship with music and the reviewing of memorized bible verses. We then separate the children into two age-appropriate groups. One group will go to craft/prayer time and the other group will go to bible story/game time. After 30 minutes the groups switch. We end the evening by gathering both groups together again to sing and pray before dismissal. The program runs Wednesday evenings throughout the school year. It is not too late to enroll a child.



We just finished a lesson series on the importance of forgiveness and are currently working on the "superheroes" of the bible. As we approach the holiday season, we look forward to sharing the Christmas Story and the birth of our Savior.

Our weekly attendance average is approximately 17 children an evening. We also have approximately five helpers from Youth group who come to help each evening with the program.
